- 24 receives appropriations in section 201, and the workforce
- 25 development agency, AND THE CENTER shall use the internet INTERNET

- 27 requirement may include transmission of reports via electronic mail

- 1 to the recipients identified for each reporting requirement or it
- 2 may include placement of reports on an internet INTERNET or
- 3 intranet site.
- 4 Sec. 206. The funds appropriated in section 201 are

- 8 (a) A community college that receives money under section
- 9 201(4) shall use that money solely for the purpose of offsetting a
- 10 portion of the retirement contributions owed by the college for
- 11 that fiscal year.
- 12 (b) The amount allocated to each participating community
- 13 college under section 201(4) shall be based on each college's
- 14 percentage of the total covered payroll for all community colleges
- 15 that are participating colleges in the immediately preceding fiscal
- 16 year.
- 17 Sec. 207b. All of the following apply to the allocation of the

- 2 college adopts its annual operating budget for the following fiscal
- 3 year, or after the board adopts a subsequent revision to that
- 4 budget, the community college shall make all of the following
- 5 available through a link on its website homepage:
- 6 (a) The annual operating budget and subsequent budget
- 7 revisions.
- 8 (b) A link to the most recent "Activities Classification
- 9 Structure Data Book and Companion".
- (c) General fund revenue and expenditure projections for
- 11 fiscal year 2015-2016-2016-2017 and fiscal year 2016-2017.2017-
- 12 2018.
- 13 (d) A listing of all debt service obligations, detailed by
- 14 project, anticipated fiscal year 2015-2016-2017 payment of
- 15 each project, and total outstanding debt.
- 16 (e) The estimated cost to the community college resulting from
- 17 the patient protection and affordable care act, Public Law 111-148,
- 18 as amended by the health care and education reconciliation act of
- 19 2010, Public Law 111-152.
- 20 (f) Links to all of the following for the community college:
- 21 (i) The current collective bargaining agreement for each
- 22 bargaining unit.
- 23 (ii) Each health care benefits plan, including, but not
- 24 limited to, medical, dental, vision, disability, long-term care, or
- 25 any other type of benefits that would constitute health care

- 11 The size of the icon may be reduced to 150×150 pixels.

- 17 under former section 210a.
