

**SUBSTITUTE FOR
HOUSE BILL NO. 5276**

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 20 (v) "MDSP" means the Michigan department of state police.
- 21 (w) "MI" means Michigan.
- 22 (x) "MUSTFA" means the Michigan underground storage tank financial
23 assurance fund.
- 24 (y) "NPL" means the federal national priority list.
- 25 Sec. 204. The department of civil service shall bill departments
26 and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charge
27 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963.

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1 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
2 the second fiscal quarter.

3 Sec. 205. (1) Beginning October 1, a hiring freeze is imposed on
4 the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
5 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service
6 employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil
7 service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal trans-
8 fers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a depart-
9 ment or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or
10 restricted funds.

11 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
12 freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring freeze
13 will result in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver
14 basic services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth
15 of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house of representa-
16 tives standing committees on appropriations the number of exceptions to
17 the hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the justifica-
18 tion for the exception.

19 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
20 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for federal
21 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until
22 they have been transferred to another line item in this act under
23 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
24 MCL 18.1393.

25 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
26 priated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state restricted
27 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until

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1 they have been transferred to another line item in this act under
2 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
3 MCL 18.1393.

4 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
5 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency funds.
6 These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been trans-
7 ferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of the man-
8 agement and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

9 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-
10 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency
11 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
12 been transferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of
13 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

14 Sec. 207. At least 60 days before beginning any effort to privati-
15 ze, the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropri-
16 ate senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and
17 the senate and house fiscal agencies. The plan shall include the cri-
18 teria under which the privatization initiative will be evaluated. The
19 evaluation shall be completed and submitted to the appropriate senate and
20 house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and the senate and
21 house fiscal agencies within 30 months.

22 Sec. 208. The department shall continue to pilot the use of the
23 Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this act. This may
24 include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients
25 identified for each reporting requirement or it may include placement of
26 reports on the Internet or legislative Intranet site. The senate and
27 house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and senate and

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1 house fiscal agencies shall be notified in writing of the Internet or
2 Intranet site of any such report. Quarterly, the department shall pro-
3 vide a cumulative listing of the reports submitted during the most recent
4 3-month period along with the Internet or Intranet site of each report,
5 and a list of those reports expected to be transmitted in the following
6 quarter.

7 Sec. 209. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the
8 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced
9 and of comparable quality American goods or services, or both, are
10 available.

11 Sec. 210. The director of each department receiving appropriations
12 in part 1 shall take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in
13 deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to
14 provide services or supplies, or both. Each director shall strongly
15 encourage firms with which the department contracts to subcontract with
16 certified businesses in depressed and deprived communities for services,
17 supplies, or both.

18 Sec. 211. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the department
19 shall prepare a report that lists all of the following regarding grant or
20 loan or grant and loan programs administered by the department for the
21 fiscal year ending on September 30, 2001:

22 (a) The name of each program.

23 (b) The goals of the program, the criteria, eligibility, process,
24 filing fees, nominating procedures, and deadlines for each program.

25 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether
26 there is a match requirement for each program.

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1 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind
2 contributions may be used as part or all of a required match.

3 (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline for
4 each program, and the contact people within the department.

5 (f) The source of funds for each program, including the citation of
6 pertinent authorizing acts.

7 (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the
8 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

9 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the
10 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

11 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to
12 the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees and
13 senate and house fiscal agencies by January 1, 2001.

14 Sec. 212. By February 15, 2001, the department shall provide the
15 state budget director, the subcommittees on natural resources and envi-
16 ronmental quality of the house and senate appropriations committees, and
17 the senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on restricted
18 fund balances, projected revenues, and expenditures for the fiscal years
19 ending September 30, 2000 and September 30, 2001.

20 Sec. 213. The department shall provide an annual report on the
21 total amount of funds received from responsible parties and legal settle-
22 ments, and the disposition of these funds. Included in the report shall
23 be a listing of the individual settlement cases, the location of the
24 facilities involved, the type of violation committed, and the amount of
25 funds received.

26 Sec. 214. The department shall notify the legislature and offer a
27 public meeting and public comment opportunity with respect to any request

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1 received by the state of Michigan to divert water from the Great Lakes
2 pursuant to the water resources development act of 1986, Public Law
3 99-665, 100 Stat. 4082.

4 Sec. 215. The department shall provide a report prepared by the
5 department's internal auditor on the activities of the internal auditor
6 for the prior fiscal year. This report shall include a listing of each
7 audit or investigation performed by the internal auditor pursuant to
8 sections 486(4) and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
9 MCL 18.1486 and 18.1487. The report shall identify the proportion of
10 time spent on each of the statutory responsibilities listed in
11 sections 485(4), 486(4), and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984
12 PA 431, MCL 18.1485, 18.1486, and 18.1487, and the time spent on all
13 other activities performed in the internal audit function. The first
14 report shall be due March 1, 2000, and biennially thereafter beginning on
15 May 1 and shall be submitted to the governor, auditor general, the senate
16 and house appropriations committees, the senate and house fiscal agen-
17 cies, and the director.

18 Sec. 216. The departments and state agencies receiving appropria-
19 tions under this act shall receive and retain copies of all reports
20 funded from appropriations in part 1. These departments and state agen-
21 cies shall follow federal and state guidelines for short-term and
22 long-term retention of these reports and records.

23 Sec. 217. The state budget director shall provide a list of pro-
24 posed work projects funded, in whole or in part, from appropriations in
25 this act to the house and senate appropriations committees on
26 November 15, 2000. This list shall provide detailed information
27 including a description of project activities and services, the total

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1 work project funding level, spending for the fiscal year ending
2 September 30, 1999, and the amount of budget authority required to com-
3 plete the project.

4 Sec. 218. A joint legislative work group on court settlements is
5 established. This work group shall consist of representatives of the
6 house and senate standing committees and the house and senate appropria-
7 tions subcommittees on natural resources and environmental quality.
8 Members shall be appointed on a bipartisan basis by the speaker of the
9 house of representatives and the senate majority leader. Assistance and
10 staff support to the work group may be provided by the house and senate
11 fiscal agencies. The work group shall issue a report on December 15,
12 2000 to the members of the legislature that includes a strategy for dis-
13 bursing settlement revenue to impacted local governmental units in a
14 manner consistent with court settlement agreements.

15 Sec. 219. (1) The department shall report all of the following
16 information relative to allocations made in part 1 for the environmental
17 cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency actions,
18 superfund cleanup, the brownfield grants and loans program, the leaking
19 underground storage tank cleanup program, the contaminated lake and river
20 sediments cleanup program, and the environmental protection bond projects
21 under section 19508(7) of the natural resources and environmental protec-
22 tion act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19508, to the state budget director, the
23 senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees on envi-
24 ronmental quality, and the senate and house fiscal agencies:

25 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is
26 made.

1 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

2 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
3 allocation is made for a response activity.

4 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be
5 completed.

6 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for
7 the site.

8 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended at
9 the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

10 (g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that were
11 redeveloped.

12 (2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also include all
13 of the following:

14 (a) The status of all state-owned facilities that are on the list
15 compiled under part 201 of the natural resources and environmental pro-
16 tection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.

17 (b) The report shall include the total amount of funds expended
18 during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds awaiting
19 expenditure.

20 (c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental protec-
21 tion bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural resources and envi-
22 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19301 to 324.19306, and
23 bonds issued pursuant to the clean Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284,
24 MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.

25 (3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each year.

[Sec. 219. By September 30, 2001, the department shall make electronically available via the department web site, a report of its efforts to implement the recommendations contained in the Michigan environmental science board report entitled "Analysis of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality Administered Environmental Standard to Protect Children's Health" dated February 2000, which shall include the following efforts to include scientific and risk assessment staff from other state agencies to address children's health issues that cross agency jurisdictional boundaries, initiatives to evaluate exposure concerns resulting from contaminated soils, and data collection and risk assessment development processes for hazardous indoor and outdoor air pollutants.]

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1 LAND AND WATER MANAGEMENT

2 Sec. 301. The department shall collect Great Lakes bottomland
3 permit fees uniformly and fairly from commercial and noncommercial users
4 of the Great Lakes bottomlands.

5 Sec. 302. By July 1, 2001, the department shall promulgate a rule
6 to designate all wetlands identified in the September 30, 1996 report
7 "The Critical Non-Contiguous Wetlands of Michigan" that are located on
8 property owned by the state as essential to the preservation of the natu-
9 ral resources of the state as provided in section 30301(d)(iii) of the
10 natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451,
11 MCL 324.30301.

12 Sec. 303. The appropriation in part 1 for water management includes
13 \$412,000.00 to inventory Michigan wetlands in counties contiguous to the
14 Great Lakes and their connecting waters. By July 1, 2001, the department
15 shall make or cause to be made a preliminary inventory of all wetlands in
16 this state on a county-by-county basis and file the inventory with the
17 agricultural extension office, register of deeds, and county clerk as
18 required by section 30321 of the natural resources and environmental pro-
19 tection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.30321. This appropriation is for the
20 first year of a 5-year effort to inventory Michigan's wetlands.

21 AIR QUALITY

22 Sec. 401. From the funds appropriated in section 107, the depart-
23 ment shall report on the status of implementation planning and permit
24 backlog reduction activities under part 55 of the natural resources and
25 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5501 to 324.5542,

1 including status of revenue collections, on an annual basis. The report
2 shall be provided to the house of representatives and senate appropria-
3 tions subcommittees on environmental quality, the standing committees of
4 the house of representatives and the senate that are responsible for
5 issues pertaining to air quality, and the governor on or before March 1,
6 2001.

[Sec. 402. The appropriation in part 1 for air quality programs includes \$60,000.00 from the scrap tire regulatory fund for 1 position. This person is to assist and encourage the timely processing of permit applications from cogeneration plants, cement, and other industrial plants which utilize tire derived fuels to facilitate the use of scrap tires.]

7 **SURFACE WATER QUALITY**

8 Sec. 501. Of the funds appropriated in section 108 for surface
9 water surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for
10 grants to local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

11 **DRINKING WATER**

12 Sec. 601. The department shall provide quarterly reports to the
13 legislature on the revenues received and expenditures made by the drink-
14 ing water and environmental units within the laboratory services appro-
15 priation line. The information shall include the types of tests con-
16 ducted, the number of tests conducted at no charge, and the allocation of
17 the general fund appropriation for each unit.

18 Sec. 602. The appropriation in part 1 for groundwater use reporting
19 shall support the cost of developing a groundwater database needed to
20 model the demands of irrigation wells on groundwater aquifers and the
21 impacts of irrigation well systems on domestic water supplies.

1 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE

2 Sec. 701. From the appropriations in part 1 for the environmental
3 cleanup and redevelopment program under part 201 of the natural resources
4 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to
5 324.20142, the department shall continue to make authorizations for
6 response activities at environmental contamination sites and for the
7 administration of the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program.

8 Sec. 702. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1 for
9 the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and redevelopment pro-
10 gram, emergency cleanup action, NPL - municipal landfill match grants,
11 state cleanup, and superfund cleanup projects is considered work project
12 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried for-
13 ward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance
14 with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
15 MCL 18.1451a:

16 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to provide
17 contaminated site cleanup.

18 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract.

19 (c) The total estimated cost of all projects is identified in each
20 line-item appropriation.

21 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2005.

22 Sec. 703. Of the funds appropriated in section 111 as state match
23 for the superfund cleanup program, an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00
24 shall be expended as state match for the hazardous substance research
25 center.

26 Sec. 704. The department shall report by March 1, 2002 all of the
27 following information relative to allocations made in section 111 for the

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1 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, state cleanup, emergency
2 actions, superfund cleanup, and revitalization revolving loan fund and
3 the environmental projects under section 19508(7) of the natural
4 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19508,
5 to the senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees
6 on environmental quality and the senate and house fiscal agencies:

7 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is
8 made.

9 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

10 (c) A brief description of how the problem will be resolved if the
11 allocation is made for a response activity.

12 (d) The estimated date that site closure activities will be
13 completed.

14 (e) The amount of the allocation, or the anticipated financing for
15 the site.

16 (f) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds expended at
17 the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal year.

18 (g) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that were
19 redeveloped.

20 STORAGE TANKS

21 Sec. 801. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan
22 underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the purpose of car-
23 rying out the duties and responsibilities as specified in part 215 of the
24 natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451,
25 MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551, are considered work project appropriations

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1 and any unencumbered funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal
2 year. The following is in compliance with section 451a(1) of the manage-
3 ment and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

4 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried forward is to carry
5 out the responsibilities of part 215 of the natural resources and envi-
6 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

7 (b) The projects will be accomplished by contract and state
8 employees.

9 (c) The total estimated cost is identified in a line-item
10 appropriation.

11 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2005.

12 (2) The Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance policy
13 board shall allocate the amount of the underground storage tank financial
14 assurance fund to be distributed to the department. If the amount recom-
15 mended by the board is less than that appropriated in section 112, expen-
16 ditures shall be adjusted accordingly.

17 (3) Included in the amounts appropriated in part 1 from the Michigan
18 underground storage tank financial assurance fund are amounts sufficient
19 to pay debt service costs on the bonds or notes issued pursuant to
20 part 215 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994
21 PA 451, MCL 324.21501 to 324.21551.

22 Sec. 802. The department shall report to the state budget director,
23 the senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees on
24 environmental quality, and the senate and house fiscal agencies no later
25 than October 31, 2001 on the Michigan underground storage tank financial
26 assurance fund. The report shall include the fund balance, estimate of
27 available revenues, number and dollar value of claims processed through

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1 September 30, 2000, and total estimated claims liability through
2 December 22, 2002.

3 Sec. 803. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1 for
4 the leaking underground storage tank cleanup program is considered work
5 project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are car-
6 ried over into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compli-
7 ance with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
8 MCL 18.1451a:

9 (a) The purpose of the projects to be carried over is to provide for
10 redevelopment and contaminated site cleanup.

11 (b) These projects will be accomplished by contract.

12 (c) The total estimated costs of all projects is identified in each
13 line-item appropriation.

14 (d) The tentative completion date for these projects is September
15 30, 2005.

16 **WASTE MANAGEMENT**

17 Sec. 901. The appropriation in part 1 for pollution prevention
18 includes authorization for 1.0 FTE position and \$60,000.00 to provide
19 technical assistance to organizations and businesses involved in recycl-
20 ing and composting.

1 ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE

2 Sec. 1001. With funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall
3 continue to implement a community right-to-know project to facilitate
4 convenient public access to information about the performance of individ-
5 ual facilities in complying with requirements of air, surface water,
6 waste management, storage tank, and environmental response programs, and
7 with any permits issued pursuant to these programs. The project shall
8 also facilitate convenient public access to information about the overall
9 quality of Michigan's air, water, groundwater, and drinking water and the
10 generation of municipal solid waste and regulated hazardous waste. In
11 implementing this section, the department shall consult with interested
12 stakeholders on a periodic basis, including, but not limited to, indus-
13 trial and environmental group representatives.

14 Sec. 1002. The appropriation in part 1 for low-income community
15 wastewater assistance shall be provided to the Michigan community action
16 agency association. This appropriation enables the association to expand
17 and maintain rural community assistance program services to all Michigan
18 counties.

[Sec. 1003. The appropriation in part 1 for environmental services includes \$125,000.00 to determine the feasibility of using scrap tires for Michigan department of transportation guard rails and signs. The department shall conduct a study of the costs and benefits of this and compare this application with other existing technologies utilizing scrap tire resources, and provide a report to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality before March 15, 2001.]

19 CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

20 Sec. 1101. The department shall provide training in support of
21 local efforts to regulate solid waste disposal. Department environmental
22 conservation officers shall be directed to help train law enforcement
23 officers and other enforcement personnel to develop community partner-
24 ships to combat illegal dumping at the local level.

1 GRANTS

2 Sec. 1201. If a certified health department does not exist in a
3 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities under
4 part 117 of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994
5 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may spend funds
6 appropriated in part 1 under the septage waste compliance program in
7 accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and environmental
8 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

9 Sec. 1202. Loans provided by the water pollution control revolving
10 fund pursuant to the appropriation in part 1 are to be repaid on sched-
11 ule, and penalties shall be assigned for delinquent repayment as provided
12 in part 53 of the natural resources and environmental protection act,
13 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5301 to 324.5316.

[Sec. 1203. Of the amount of money appropriated in part 1 for
scrap tire grants, \$100,000.00 shall be available for grants to
communities to cover scrap tire fire suppression costs, provided
owner liability bonds and other available funding sources have been
exhausted.]
