

SENATE SUBSTITUTE FOR

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

- 19 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963.
- 20 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
- 21 the second fiscal quarter.
- 22          Sec. 205. (1) Beginning October 1, a hiring freeze is imposed on
- 23 the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies are
- 24 prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil service
- 25 employees and prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil
- 26 service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal
- 27 transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a

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1 department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or

23       (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is appro-  
24 priated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency funds.  
25 These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been trans-  
26 ferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of the  
27 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

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1       (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is  
2 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency  
3 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have  
4 been transferred to another line item in this act under section 393(2) of  
5 the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

6       Sec. 207. At least 60 days before beginning any effort to privati-  
7 ze, the department shall submit a complete project plan to the appropri-  
8 ate senate and house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and  
9 the senate and house fiscal agencies. The plan shall include the cri-  
10 teria under which the privatization initiative will be evaluated. The  
11 evaluation shall be completed and submitted to the appropriate senate and  
12 house of representatives appropriations subcommittees and the senate and  
13 house fiscal agencies within 30 months.

14       Sec. 208. The department shall continue to pilot the use of the  
15 Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this act. This may  
16 include transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients

25       (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the

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1 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the  
2 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

3 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to  
4 the senate and house of representatives appropriations committees and  
5 senate and house fiscal agencies by January 1, 2001.

6 Sec. 212. By February 15, 2001, the department shall provide the  
7 state budget director, the subcommittees on natural resources and envi-  
8 ronmental quality of the house and senate appropriations committees, and  
9 the senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on restricted  
10 fund balances, projected revenues, and expenditures for the fiscal years  
11 ending September 30, 2000 and September 30, 2001.

12 Sec. 213. The department shall provide an annual report on the  
13 total amount of funds received from responsible parties and legal settle-  
14 ments, and the disposition of these funds. Included in the report shall  
15 be a listing of the individual settlement cases, the location of the  
16 facilities involved, the type of violation committed, and the amount of  
17 funds received.

18 Sec. 214. The department shall notify the legislature and offer a  
19 public meeting and public comment opportunity with respect to any request  
20 received by the state of Michigan to divert water from the Great Lakes  
21 pursuant to the water resources development act of 1986, Public Law  
22 99-665, 100 Stat. 4082.

23 Sec. 215. The department shall provide a report prepared by the  
24 department's internal auditor on the activities of the internal auditor  
25 for the prior fiscal year. This report shall include a listing of each  
26 audit or investigation performed by the internal auditor pursuant to  
27 sections 486(4) and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,



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1 MCL 18.1486 and 18.1487. The report shall identify the proportion of  
2 time spent on each of the statutory responsibilities listed in  
3 sections 485(4), 486(4), and 487 of the management and budget act, 1984  
4 PA 431, MCL 18.1485, 18.1486, and 18.1487, and the time spent on all  
5 other activities performed in the internal audit function. The first  
6 report shall be due March 1, 2000, and biennially thereafter beginning on

10 Sec. 216. The departments and state agencies receiving appropria-

5 (2) The report prepared under subsection (1) shall also include all

7 (a) The status of all state-owned facilities that are on the list  
8 compiled under part 201 of the natural resources and environmental pro-  
9 tection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.

10 (b) The report shall include the total amount of funds expended  
11 during the fiscal year and the total amount of funds awaiting  
12 expenditure.

13 (c) The total amount of bonds issued for the environmental protec-  
14 tion bond program pursuant to part 193 of the natural resources and envi-  
15 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.19301 to 324.19306, and  
16 bonds issued pursuant to the clean Michigan initiative act, 1998 PA 284,  
17 MCL 324.95101 to 324.95108.

18 (3) The report shall be made available by March 31 of each year.

19 Sec. 220. By September 30, 2001, the department shall make elec-  
20 tronically available via the department web site, a report of its efforts  
21 to implement the recommendations contained in the Michigan environmental  
22 science board report entitled "Analysis of the Michigan Department of  
23 Environmental Quality Administered Environmental Standard to Protect  
24 Children's Health" dated February 2000, which shall include the following  
25 efforts to include scientific and risk assessment staff from other state  
26 agencies to address children's health issues that cross agency

### **8 LAND AND WATER MANAGEMENT**

9       Sec. 301. The department shall collect Great Lakes bottomland  
10 permit fees uniformly and fairly from commercial and noncommercial users  
11 of the Great Lakes bottomlands.

12       Sec. 303. By July 1, 2001, the department shall make or cause to be  
13 made a grant request to the Michigan Great Lakes protection fund for the  
14 purpose of an inventory of Michigan wetlands in counties contiguous to  
15 the Great Lakes and their connecting waters. The grant request may also  
16 include plans for the inventory of all remaining wetlands in this state  
17 on a county-by-county basis. Upon completion, the inventory shall be  
18 filed with the agricultural extension office, register of deeds, and  
19 county clerk as required by section 30321 of the natural resources and  
20 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.30321.

**1 AIR QUALITY**

2       Sec. 401. The department shall report quarterly, via the  
3 department's Internet website, on air quality program expenditures and  
4 revenues. The report shall include expenditures and revenues by fund  
5 source, and by program function.

**6 SURFACE WATER QUALITY**

7       Sec. 501. Of the funds appropriated in section 108 for surface  
8 water surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for  
9 grants to local organizations for water quality monitoring activities.

10       Sec. 502. (1) The department, in conjunction with the department of  
11 natural resources, shall provide a report on the impact of non-native,  
12 aquatic nuisance species and other non-native species on the natural  
13 resources and environment of the state. The report shall include recom-  
14 mendations for reducing or eliminating the negative impacts of such spe-  
15 cies on the natural resources and the environment of the state, and rec-  
16 ommendations on how to prohibit new introductions of non-native aquatic  
17 nuisance species and other non-native species.

18       (2) The report required in subsection (1) may be included as a part  
19 of any report the department is required to prepare that assesses the  
20 status of and trends related to the overall state of the natural environ-  
21 ment in the state. The report shall be submitted to the governor, to the  
22 standing committees of the legislature with jurisdiction over issues pri-  
23 marily related to natural resources and the environment, and to the  
24 senate and house appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality

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1 and natural resources. The report shall be submitted not later than  
2 October 1, 2001.

### 3 DRINKING WATER

4 Sec. 601. The department shall provide quarterly reports to the  
5 legislature on the revenues received and expenditures made by the drink-  
6 ing water and environmental units within the laboratory services appro-  
7 priation line. The information shall include the types of tests con-  
8 ducted, the number of tests conducted at no charge, and the allocation of  
9 the general fund appropriation for each unit.

10 Sec. 602. The appropriation in part 1 for groundwater use reporting  
11 shall support the cost of developing a groundwater database needed to  
12 model the demands of irrigation wells on groundwater aquifers and the  
13 impacts of irrigation well systems on domestic water supplies.

### 14 ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE

15 Sec. 701. From the appropriations in part 1 for the environmental  
16 cleanup and redevelopment program under part 201 of the natural resources  
17 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to  
18 324.20142, the department shall continue to make authorizations for  
19 response activities at environmental contamination sites and for the  
20 administration of the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program.

21 Sec. 702. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in part 1 for  
22 the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and redevelopment  
23 program, emergency cleanup action, NPL - municipal landfill match grants,

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1 state cleanup, and superfund cleanup projects is considered work project  
2 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried for-  
3 ward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance  
4 with section 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,

**1 WASTE MANAGEMENT**

2       Sec. 901. The appropriation in part 1 for pollution prevention  
3 includes authorization for 1.0 FTE position and \$60,000.00 to provide  
4 technical assistance to organizations and businesses involved in recycl-  
5 ing and composting.

6       Sec. 902. The department shall provide a report by September 30,  
7 2001 to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on environmen-  
8 tal quality, and the house and senate fiscal agencies that summarizes the  
9 projects awarded, and related expenditures under the solid wastes alter-  
10 natives program portion of the environmental protection bond implementa-

5 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to 324.11719, then the department may spend funds  
6 appropriated in part 1 under the septage waste compliance program in  
7 accordance with section 11716 of the natural resources and environmental  
8 protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11716.

9       Sec. 1202. Loans provided by the water pollution control revolving  
10 fund pursuant to the appropriation in part 1 are to be repaid on sched-  
11 ule, and penalties shall be assigned for delinquent repayment as provided  
12 in part 53 of the natural resources and environmental protection act,  
13 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5301 to 324.5316.

14       Sec. 1203. Of the amount of money appropriated in part 1 for scrap  
15 tire grants, \$100,000.00 shall be available for grants to communities to  
16 cover scrap tire fire suppression costs, provided owner liability bonds  
17 and other available funding sources have been exhausted.
