The bill would create the Interstate Compact for Adult Supervision, which would establish Michigan's participation in a new interstate compact for the transfer of supervision of parolees and probationers. (The bill would not repeal current statute providing for an interstate compact for parole and probation; presumably, current statute would prevail until the new compact took effect following enactment into law by at least 35 states.)

Under the compact, interstate movement of adult offenders would be overseen by an interstate commission whose annual budget would be funded through annual assessments collected from the participating states. The aggregate annual assessment would be based upon a formula that considered the population of the state and the volume of interstate movement of offenders in each compacting state. The Council of State Governments has estimated that Michigan's assessment would be \$32,000, assuming participation from all 50 states, five territories, and the District of Columbia. This would be an increase of \$30,000 over the \$2,000 annual cost of participation in the current compact.
