## Fiscal Analysis SENTENCING GUIDELINES: LPG VIOLATIONS

## **Analysis** Summary

The bill would amend the Code of Criminal Procedure to establish sentencing guidelines for offenses under HB 4900, which would make improper transfers of LPG gas a felony punishable by imprisonment for up to two years and a fine of up to \$1,000. Under HB 5003, the offense would be a Class G offense against public order. Recommended minimum sentence ranges would vary from 0-3 months (for which a local sanction must be imposed) to 7-23 months (for which either a prison sentence or a local sanction may be imposed). The bill could not take effect unless HB 4900 also was enacted.

## **Fiscal Impact**

Together with HB 4900, the bill would have an indeterminate impact on the state and local units of government. Currently, violations of the applicable law are 90-day misdemeanors, which are wholly a local responsibility. Under the bills, violations would be felonies generally punished with local sanctions including probation supervision (a state responsibility) and up to 12 months in jail (a local cost).
