- 3 Sec. 802. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for the
- 4 surface water program, the department shall prepare a plan by
- 5 September 30, 2008 for the virtual elimination of sewage discharges
- 6 into waters of the state by 2015. The plan shall include all of the
- 7 following information:
- 8 (a) A discussion of the major infrastructure projects
- 9 undertaken and planned over the next 5 to 10 years to increase the
