## **SENATE BILL No. 980**

November 10, 2009, Introduced by Senator GILBERT and referred to the Committee on Transportation.

A bill to amend 1949 PA 300, entitled "Michigan vehicle code,"

by amending section 698 (MCL 257.698), as amended by 1998 PA 247, and by adding section 682c.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 SEC. 682C. (1) A PERSON SHALL NOT OPERATE A COMMERCIAL SNOW
- 2 REMOVAL VEHICLE TO REMOVE SNOW OR ICE ON A PUBLIC ROADWAY OR IN A
- 3 PARKING LOT ACCESSIBLE FOR USE BY THE PUBLIC UNLESS BOTH OF THE
- 4 FOLLOWING APPLY:
- 5 (A) THE VEHICLE IS OPERATED WITH AT LEAST 1 FLASHING,
- ROTATING, OR OSCILLATING YELLOW OR AMBER LIGHT THAT IS CLEARLY
- 7 VISIBLE IN A 360-DEGREE ARC FROM A DISTANCE OF 500 FEET WHEN IN
- 8 USE.
- (B) THE VEHICLE IS OPERATED WITH A REVERSE SIGNAL ALARM

- 1 AUDIBLE ABOVE THE SURROUNDING NOISE LEVEL OR THE VEHICLE IS BACKED
- 2 UP ONLY WHEN AN OBSERVER SIGNALS THAT IT IS SAFE TO DO SO.
- 3 (2) A PERSON WHO OWNS OR LEASES A COMMERCIAL SNOW REMOVAL
- 4 VEHICLE USED TO REMOVE SNOW OR ICE ON A PUBLIC ROADWAY OR IN A
- 5 PUBLIC PARKING LOT SHALL NOT KNOWINGLY ALLOW A PERSON TO OPERATE
- 6 THAT VEHICLE IN VIOLATION OF SUBSECTION (1).
- 7 (3) AS USED IN THIS SECTION:
- 8 (A) "COMMERCIAL SNOW REMOVAL VEHICLE" MEANS A VEHICLE EQUIPPED
- 9 WITH A PLOW OR OTHER DEVICE THAT IS USED TO REMOVE SNOW OR ICE FOR
- 10 PAYMENT OR OTHER REMUNERATION.
- 11 (B) "PERSON" INCLUDES THIS STATE AND POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OF
- 12 THIS STATE.
- 13 (4) A PERSON WHO VIOLATES THIS SECTION IS GUILTY OF A
- 14 MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY IMPRISONMENT FOR NOT MORE THAN 90 DAYS OR
- 15 A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$500.00, OR BOTH.
- Sec. 698. (1) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more
- 17 than 2 side cowl or fender lamps which THAT shall emit an amber or
- 18 white light without glare.
- 19 (2) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more than 1
- 20 running board courtesy lamp on each side which THAT shall emit a
- 21 white or amber light without glare.
- 22 (3) Backing lights of red, amber, or white may be mounted on
- 23 the rear of a motor vehicle if the switch controlling the light is
- 24 so arranged that the light may be turned on only if the vehicle is
- 25 in reverse gear. The backing lights when unlighted shall be covered
- 26 or otherwise arranged so as not to reflect objectionable glare in
- 27 the eyes of a driver of a vehicle approaching from the rear.

- 1 (4) Unless both covered and unlit, a vehicle driven on the
- 2 highways of this state shall not be equipped with a lamp or a part
- 3 designed to be a reflector unless expressly required or permitted
- 4 by this chapter or that meets the standards prescribed in 49 C.F.R.
- 5 CFR 571.108. A lamp or a part designed to be a reflector, if
- 6 visible from the front, shall display or reflect a white or amber
- 7 light; if visible from either side, shall display or reflect an
- 8 amber or red light; and if visible from the rear, shall display or
- 9 reflect a red light, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 10 (5) The use or possession of flashing, oscillating, or
- 11 rotating lights of any color is prohibited except as otherwise
- 12 provided by law, or under the following circumstances:
- 13 (a) A police vehicle shall be equipped with flashing,
- 14 rotating, or oscillating red or blue lights, for use in the
- 15 performance of police duties.
- 16 (b) A fire vehicle or ambulance available for public use or
- 17 for use of the United States, the state, or any unit of the state,
- 18 whether publicly or privately owned, shall be equipped with
- 19 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights and used as required
- 20 for safety.
- 21 (c) An authorized emergency vehicle as defined in section 2
- 22 may be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights
- 23 for use when responding to an emergency call if when in use the
- 24 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights are mounted on the
- 25 roof section of the vehicle, either as a permanent installation or
- 26 by means of suction cups or magnets and are clearly visible in a
- 27 360-degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. A person

- 1 operating lights under this subdivision at any time other than when
- 2 responding to an emergency call is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 3 (d) Flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights, placed in
- 4 a position as to be visible throughout an arc of 360 degrees, shall
- 5 be used by a state, county, or municipal vehicle engaged in the
- 6 removal of ice, snow, or other material from the highway. and in
- 7 other operations designed to control ice and snow.
- 8 (e) A vehicle used for the cleanup of spills or a necessary
- 9 emergency response action taken pursuant to state or federal law or
- 10 a vehicle operated by an employee of the department of natural
- 11 resources that responds to a spill, emergency response action,
- 12 complaint, or compliance activity may be equipped with flashing,
- 13 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. Such lights shall not be
- 14 activated unless the vehicle is at the scene of a spill, emergency
- 15 response action, complaint, or compliance activity.
- 16 (f) A vehicle to perform public utility service, a vehicle
- 17 owned or leased by and licensed as a business for use in the
- 18 collection and hauling of refuse, an automobile service car or
- 19 wrecker, a vehicle engaged in authorized highway repair or
- 20 maintenance, a vehicle of a peace officer, a vehicle operated by a
- 21 rural letter carrier or a person under contract to deliver
- 22 newspapers or other publications by motor route, a vehicle utilized
- 23 for snow OR ICE removal UNDER SECTION 682C, a private security
- 24 quard vehicle as authorized in subsection (7), a motor vehicle
- 25 while engaged in escorting or transporting an oversize load that
- 26 has been issued a permit by the state transportation department or
- 27 a local authority with respect to highways under its jurisdiction,

- 1 a vehicle owned by the national guard or a United States military
- 2 vehicle while traveling under the appropriate recognized military
- 3 authority, a motor vehicle while towing an implement of husbandry,
- 4 or an implement of husbandry may be equipped with flashing,
- 5 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. However, a wrecker may be
- 6 equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights which
- 7 shall be activated only when the wrecker is engaged in removing or
- 8 assisting a vehicle at the scene of a traffic accident or
- 9 disablement. The flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights
- 10 shall not be activated except in those circumstances that the
- 11 warning produced by the lights is required for public safety.
- 12 (g) A vehicle engaged in leading or escorting a funeral
- 13 procession or any vehicle that is part of a funeral procession may
- 14 be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating purple or amber
- 15 lights which shall not be activated except during a funeral
- 16 procession.
- 17 (h) An authorized emergency vehicle may display flashing,
- 18 rotating, or oscillating white lights in conjunction with an
- 19 authorized emergency light as prescribed in this section.
- 20 (i) A private motor vehicle of a physician responding to an
- 21 emergency call may be equipped with and the physician may use
- 22 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights mounted on the roof
- 23 section of the vehicle either as a permanent installation or by
- 24 means of magnets or suction cups and clearly visible in a 360-
- 25 degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. The physician
- 26 shall first obtain written authorization from the county sheriff.
- 27 (j) A public transit vehicle may be equipped with a flashing,

- 1 oscillating, or rotating light mounted on the roof of the vehicle
- 2 approximately 6 feet from the rear of the vehicle which displays a
- 3 white light to the front, side, and rear of the vehicle, which
- 4 light may be actuated by the driver for use only in inclement
- 5 weather such as fog, rain, or snow, when boarding or discharging
- 6 passengers, from 1/2 hour before sunset until 1/2 hour after
- 7 sunrise, or where conditions hinder the visibility of the public
- 8 transit vehicle. As used in this subdivision, "public transit
- 9 vehicle" means a motor vehicle, other than a station wagon or
- 10 passenger van, with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than
- 11 10,000 pounds.
- 12 (k) A person engaged in the manufacture, sale, or repair of
- 13 flashing, rotating, or oscillating lights governed by this
- 14 subsection may possess the lights for the purpose of employment,
- 15 but shall not activate the lights upon the highway unless
- 16 authorized to do so under subsection (6).
- 17 (6) A person shall not sell, loan, or otherwise furnish a
- 18 flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or red light designed
- 19 primarily for installation on an authorized emergency vehicle to a
- 20 person except a police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, authorized
- 21 physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambulance
- 22 driver, licensed ambulance driver or attendant of the state, a
- 23 county or municipality within the state, a person engaged in the
- 24 business of operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 25 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization which owns
- 26 and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 27 emergencies. This subsection does not prohibit an authorized

- 1 vehicle, equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or
- 2 red lights, from being operated by a person other than a person
- 3 described in this section if the person receives authorization to
- 4 operate the emergency vehicle from a police officer, sheriff,
- 5 deputy sheriff, authorized physician, volunteer or paid fire
- 6 fighter, volunteer ambulance driver, licensed ambulance driver or
- 7 attendant, a person operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 8 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization which THAT
- 9 owns and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 10 emergencies, except that the authorization shall not permit the
- 11 person to operate lights as described in subsection (5)(a), (b),
- 12 (c), (i), or (j), or to exercise the privileges described in
- 13 section 603. A person who operates an authorized emergency vehicle
- 14 in violation of the terms of an authorization is guilty of a
- 15 misdemeanor.
- 16 (7) A private motor vehicle of a security guard agency or
- 17 alarm company licensed pursuant to UNDER the private security guard
- 18 act of 1968, 1968 PA 330, MCL 338.1051 to 338.1085 338.1083, may
- 19 display flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights. The
- 20 flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights shall not be
- 21 activated on a public highway when a vehicle is in motion.
- 22 (8) This section shall not be construed to prohibit, restrict,
- 23 or limit the use of lights authorized or required under sections
- 24 697, 697a, and 698a.
- 25 (9) A person who violates subsection (1), (2), (3), or (4) is
- 26 responsible for a civil infraction.

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
