HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.257

Reps. LaFave and Crawford offered the following resolution: 1 A resolution to reaffirm the sovereignty of tribal nations and 2 to encourage the Michigan Attorney General to not infringe on that 3 sovereignty. 4 Whereas, Article I, Section 8 of the U.S. Constitution recognizes tribal nations as sovereign governments. Tribal nations' right to self-governance has been repeatedly reaffirmed by 6 7 treaties, the U.S. Supreme Court, executive orders, and laws 8 enacted by Congress; and Whereas, The Indian Gaming Regulatory Act of 1988 permits 9 tribes to operate Class III casino-style gaming activities on 10 Indian reservations. The state of Michigan has entered into tribal-11 12 state compacts with twelve federally-recognized tribes to authorize 13 Class III casino-style gaming. The state of Michigan has no





authority to regulate Indian gaming, except to ensure compliance 1 with the provisions of each tribal-state compact; and 2 Whereas, In response to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19), the 3 Governor has issued a number of executive orders to limit the 4 5 operation of businesses and require people to stay home, with 6 exceptions, through May 28, 2020. Despite most cases of COVID-19 7 being reported in the southern part of the state, far from a 8 majority of Indian casinos, tribal governments followed federal and 9 state guidelines to close Class III casino-style gaming facilities 10 under their jurisdiction; and 11 Whereas, After weeks of economic closure and staying at home, the number of COVID-19 cases has steadily declined. Tribal 12 governments, often relying on casino revenue to fund services and 13 14 infrastructure, announced plans to reopen casinos before the 15 Governor's most recent stay-at-home order expires. The Hannahville 16 Indian Community announced plans to reopen a casino in the Upper Peninsula in phases beginning May 6, 2020; and 17 18 Whereas, On May 5, 2020, in a letter addressed to the Hannahville Indiana Community Tribal Chairperson, the Michigan 19 20 Attorney General warned that casino employees and patrons who visit the casino prior to the expiration of the Governor's stay-at-home 21 order would be subject to civil and criminal penalties. Although 22 the letter acknowledges the tribe's right to self-governance, which 23 24 includes the right to reopen its casinos at any date, it serves as 25 a veiled-threat to control the actions of a sovereign tribal 26 nation; now, therefore, be it 27 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we reaffirm the 28 sovereignty of tribal nations and encourage the Michigan Attorney

General to not infringe on that sovereignty; and be it further
