## HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.38

Reps. Lasinski, Pagan, Ellison, Warren, Sowerby, Hertel, Cambensy, Hood, Pohutsky, Stone, Tyrone Carter, Shannon, Garza, Brenda Carter, Kennedy, Manoogian, Cynthia Johnson, Witwer, Garrett, Byrd, Berman, Anthony, Coleman, Kuppa, Hope, Elder, Yancey, Haadsma, Bolden, Brixie, Rabhi, Hammoud, Robinson and Love offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution to declare March 8, 2019, as International
- 2 Women's Day in the state of Michigan.
- 3 Whereas, March 8, 2019, marks the 108th anniversary of the
- 4 celebration of International Women's Day. Originally called
- 5 International Working Women's Day, it is celebrated on March 8 of
- 6 every year; and
- 7 Whereas, International Women's Day is a global day celebrating

- the economic, political, and social achievements of women in thepast, present, and future. It is a day when women are recognized
- 3 for their achievements, regardless of divisions, whether national,
- 4 ethnic, linguistic, cultural, economic, or political. It is an
- 5 occasion for looking back on past struggles and accomplishments
- 6 and, more importantly, for looking ahead to the untapped potential
- 7 and opportunities that await future generations of women; and
- 8 Whereas, In different regions the focus of the celebrations
- 9 ranges from general celebration of respect, appreciation, and love
- 10 towards women to a celebration for women's economic, political, and
- 11 social achievements; and
- 12 Whereas, The earliest Women's Day observance was held in 1909
- 13 in New York and was organized in remembrance of the strike of the
- 14 International Ladies' Garment Workers Union. At the second
- 15 International Women's Conference in 1910, the first International
- 16 Women's Day was officially established to promote equal rights,
- 17 including suffrage, for women. The following year, International
- 18 Women's Day was marked by over a million people in Austria,
- 19 Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland. The efforts of early European
- 20 pioneers led to women gaining the right to vote and to hold public
- 21 office and the establishment of many early prohibitions against
- 22 employment sex discrimination; and
- Whereas, In 1975, during the United Nations (UN) International
- 24 Year for Women, the UN held its first official celebration of
- 25 International Women's Day. Two years later, in December 1977, the
- 26 General Assembly adopted a resolution proclaiming a United Nations
- 27 Day for Women's Rights and International Peace to be observed by
- 28 member states. In adopting this resolution, the General Assembly
- 29 recognized the role of women in peace efforts and development and

- 1 urged an end to discrimination and an increase of support for
- 2 women's full and equal participation; and
- 3 Whereas, Beginning in 1996, International Women's Day
- 4 organizers began adopting a theme to each year's celebrations that
- 5 reinforces its commitment to women's rights and world peace.
- 6 Successful campaigns centered on such themes as "Celebrating the
- 7 Past, Planning for the Future" (1996) and "Women in Decision-
- **8** Making" (2006); and
- 9 Whereas, Presidents of the United States have consecutively
- 10 declared March to be Women's History Month since 1988 after the
- 11 National Women's History Project petitioned the United States
- 12 Congress in 1987 for recognition of Women's History Month, and have
- 13 since announced the 2019 theme of "Visionary Women: Champions of
- 14 Peace & Nonviolence"; and
- 15 Whereas, On the occasion of 2010 International Women's Day,
- 16 the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) drew attention
- 17 to the hardships displaced women endure by spreading awareness of
- 18 the displacement of populations as one of the gravest consequences
- 19 of today's armed conflicts; and
- Whereas, There are more than 3.7 billion women in the world
- 21 today. Women around the world participate in the political, social,
- 22 and economic life of their communities, play a critical role in
- 23 providing and caring for their families, contribute substantially
- 24 to the growth of economies, and, as both farmers and caregivers,
- 25 play an important role in advancing food security for their
- 26 communities; and
- Whereas, The advancement of women is a public policy priority
- 28 for our country and the state of Michigan and the ability of women
- 29 to realize their full potential is critical to the ability of a

1 country and state to achieve strong and lasting economic growth and
2 social stability; and

Whereas, According to the International Monetary Fund,

'focusing on the needs and empowerment of women is one of the keys

to human development" and according to the 2012 World Economic

Forum Global Gender Gap Report, "reducing gender inequality

enhances productivity and economic growth"; and

Whereas, According to the World Bank 2012 World Development Report: Gender Equality and Development, "greater gender equality is also smart economics, enhancing productivity and improving other development outcomes, including prospects for the next generation and for the quality of societal policies and institutions"; and

Whereas, Although strides have been made in recent decades, women around the world continue to face significant obstacles in all aspects of their lives, including underrepresentation in all aspects of public life, denial of basic human rights, and discrimination; and

Whereas, Despite some achievements by individual women leaders, women around the world are still vastly underrepresented in high level positions and in national and local legislatures and governments and, according to the Inter-Parliamentary Union, women account for only 24 percent of national parliamentarians; and

Whereas, Women remain underrepresented in conflict prevention and conflict resolution efforts, despite proven successes by women in conflict-affected regions in moderating violent extremism, resolving disputes through non-violent mediation and negotiation, and stabilizing their societies by improving access to peace and security services, institutions, and decision making venues; and

Whereas, According to the Food and Agriculture Organization of

the United Nations, the majority of women living in rural areas of 1 the developing world are heavily engaged in agricultural labor, yet 2 they receive less credit, land, agricultural inputs, and training 3 than their male counterparts; and 4 5 Whereas, It is imperative to alleviate violence and 6 discrimination against women and afford them every opportunity to 7 be full and productive members of their communities; and 8 Whereas, March 8 is recognized each year as International 9 Women's Day, a global day to celebrate the economic, political, and 10 social achievements of women past, present, and future, and a day 11 to recognize the obstacles that women still face in the struggle for equal rights and opportunities; now, therefore, be it 12 13 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of 14 this legislative body declare March 8, 2019, as International 15 Women's Day in the state of Michigan. We support the goals of International Women's Day, recognize that the empowerment of women 16 is inextricably linked to the potential of countries to generate 17 18 economic growth, sustainable democracy, and inclusive security, honor the women in the United States and around the world who have 19 20 worked throughout history to ensure that women are quaranteed 21 equality and basic human rights, reaffirm the movement's commitment 22 to ending discrimination and violence against women and girls, to 23 ensuring the safety and welfare of women and girls, and to pursuing 24 policies that quarantee the basic human rights of women and girls

worldwide, and encourage the people of Michigan to observe

International Women's Day with appropriate programs and activities.
