11 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized
 12 under this part and part 1 and the departments, commissions,
 13 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made
 14 under this part and part 1 are subject to the management and budget
 15 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

16 Sec. 203. If the state administrative board, acting under
 17 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount
 18 appropriated under part 1, the legislature may, by a concurrent
 19 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and
 20 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within part 1 for the
 21 particular department, board, commission, office, or institution.

22 Sec. 204. Funds appropriated in part 1 are subject to
 23 applicable federal audit and reporting requirements. Prompt action
 24 shall be taken if instances of noncompliance are identified,

23 teacher talent pipeline shortages exacerbated by the COVID-19
24 pandemic.

25 (c) Have an established national track record of teacher
26 recruitment, training, and ongoing support across at least 10
27 states, have existing operations in Michigan supporting not less
28 than 100 educators, and have a history of at least 5 years of
29 recruiting, developing, and retaining high-performing educators to



1 teach in at-risk schools in Michigan. A program funded under this
 2 section must have mechanisms in place and the ability to quickly
 3 upscale operations to 3 additional districts in the state beyond
 4 its current operation with a balance of rural and urban districts,
 5 and shall not charge teachers or prospective teachers a fee or
 6 tuition for program participation.

7 (d) Work with external evaluators to provide recommendations
 8 to the department for best practices to scale similar programs
 9 statewide.

10 (2) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
 11 GEER II - teacher talent pipeline are designated as a work project
 12 appropriation. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse
 13 at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for
 14 expenditure for the project under this section until the project
 15 has been completed. The following is in compliance with section
 16 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

17 (a) The purpose of the project is to improve the teacher
 18 talent pipeline by recruiting and retaining high-performing
 19 educators through grants to be allocated no later than January 31,
 20 2022 to 1 education-related nonprofit organization that supports
 21 teacher recruitment, training, development, and retention.

22 (b) The project will be accomplished by the department of
 23 education.

24 (c) The estimated cost of the project is \$10,000,000.00.

25 (d) The tentative completion date for the project is September

27 Sec. 302. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for PRIME
 28 schools, not less than \$5,800,000.00 must be allocated to the SME
 29 education foundation's partnership response initiative. The SME



1 education foundation's partnership response initiative must use the
 2 funding to provide high schools in this state with cost-effective
 3 and tailored engineering and manufacturing programs that provide
 4 equipment, curricula, professional development, scholarships, and
 5 STEM-focused curricular activities to students enrolled in and
 6 teachers teaching in high schools of this state. The department may
 7 use up to \$200,000.00 from the funds appropriated for PRIME schools
 8 to support 1 full-time equated position to administer the program.

10 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

11 Sec. 401. It is the intent of the legislature that the funds

9 supplies and equipment, including home test kits, the method by
10 which the school district, public school academy, intermediate
11 school district, or nonpublic school can opt out, and the maximum
12 amount of direct financial reimbursement that each school district,
13 public school academy, intermediate school district, or nonpublic
14 school could receive based on an equitable head count distribution.
15 If a school district, public school academy, intermediate school
16 district, or nonpublic school notifies the department of health and
17 human services and the Michigan Association of Intermediate School
18 Administrators not more than 10 business days after receiving the
19 required notification in this subsection from the department of
20 health and human services that it does not wish to participate in
21 the direct distribution of coronavirus testing and contact tracing

14 redistribute coronavirus testing and contact tracing supplies and
15 equipment, including home test kits, from an eligible school
16 district, public school academy, intermediate school district, or
17 nonpublic school without first receiving the consent of that
18 eligible school district, public school academy, intermediate
19 school district, or nonpublic school.

20 (5) The department of health and human services must
21 collaborate with the Michigan Association of Intermediate School

24 legislative changes. The grantee that receives the funds
25 appropriated in this section must have experience in developing
26 prescription digital therapeutics to provide better outcomes for
27 patients who suffer from substance use disorders. The grantee must

7 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2025.

8 Sec. 408. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for mental
 9 health crisis services, \$100,000.00 shall be allocated to an
 10 established 501(c) (3) mental health crisis services organization
 11 located in a county with a population between 1,000,000 and
 12 1,500,000 according to the most recent federal decennial census
 13 that provided supportive mental health services prior to December
 14 6, 2021 to individuals living in a school district that is located
 15 in a charter township that has a population between 22,000 and
 16 23,000 according to the most recent federal decennial census that
 17 is located in the same county and has a high school located in that
 18 charter township.

 20 **DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY**

21 Sec. 501. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for at-
 22 risk youth grants, \$3,750,000.00 must be awarded to the Michigan
 23 franchise holder of the national Jobs for America's Graduates
 24 program.

25 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for at-risk youth
 26 grants, not more than \$1,000,000.00 must be allocated to leverage
 27 nonstate contributions to the Michigan franchise holder of the
 28 national Jobs for America's Graduates program.

29 Sec. 502. The funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP - arts and



1 cultural programs are appropriated to support programming and
2 general operating expenses to cover up to 100% of the costs of the
3 programs that the grants support, to prevent, prepare for, respond
4 to, and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, with a priority on
5 opening for in-person activities.

6 Sec. 503. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for COVID-19
7 emergency rental assistance are directed to the department of labor
8 and economic opportunity, to be administered by the terms set forth
9 in section 3201 of the American rescue plan act of 2021, 15 USC
10 9058c, authorizing the United States Department of Treasury to make
