HOUSE BILL NO. 6499

November 29, 2022, Introduced by Rep. Alexander and referred to the Committee on Regulatory Reform.

A bill to amend 1995 PA 279, entitled "Horse racing law of 1995,"

by amending sections 6a and 20 (MCL 431.306a and 431.320), as amended by 2019 PA 153.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- Sec. 6a. (1) The horse racing advisory commission is created
 within the department of agriculture and rural development.
- 3 (2) The advisory commission consists of the following members,
 4 appointed by the governor:
- 5 (a) An individual who has knowledge about and expertise in

- horse racing in this state, who shall serve as chairperson of theadvisory commission.
- 3 (b) The director of the department of agriculture and rural
 4 development or his or her the director's designee.
 - (c) A veterinarian.

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- 6 (d) Two individuals from 2 different statewide horse racing7 associations.
- 8 (e) Two individuals who are owners or operators, or designees
 9 of owners or operators, of 2 different horse racetracks in this
 10 state.An individual who is an owner or operator, or a designee of
 11 an owner or operator, of a horse racetrack in this state.
- (3) The governor shall appoint the members first appointed tothe advisory commission by September 29, 2016.
- (4) Members of the advisory commission under subsection
 (2) (c), (d), and (e) shall serve for terms of 4 years or until a
 successor is appointed, whichever is later.
- 17 (5) If a vacancy occurs on the advisory commission, the 18 governor shall make an appointment for the unexpired term in the 19 same manner as the original appointment.
 - (6) The governor may remove a member of the advisory commission for incompetence, dereliction of duty, malfeasance, misfeasance, or nonfeasance in office, or any other good cause.
 - (7) The chairperson of the advisory commission appointed under subsection (2)(a) shall call the first meeting of the advisory commission. At the first meeting, the advisory commission shall elect from among its members other officers as it considers necessary or appropriate. After the first meeting, the advisory commission shall meet at the call of the chairperson or if requested by 3 or more members.

- 1 (8) A majority of the members of the advisory commission
- 2 constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at a meeting of
- 3 the advisory commission. A majority of the members present and
- 4 serving are required for official action of the advisory
- 5 commission.
- 6 (9) The advisory commission shall conduct its business at
- 7 public meetings held in compliance with the open meetings act, 1976
- 8 PA 267, MCL 15.261 to 15.275.
- 9 (10) A writing prepared, owned, used, in the possession of, or
- 10 retained by the advisory commission in the performance of an
- 11 official function is subject to the freedom of information act,
- 12 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to 15.246.
- 13 (11) Members of the advisory commission shall serve without
- 14 compensation. However, members of the advisory commission may be
- 15 reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the
- 16 performance of their official duties as members of the advisory
- 17 commission.
- 18 (12) The advisory commission shall do all of the following:
- 19 (a) Establish for the racing commissioner procedures governing
- 20 the operation and promotion of horse racing in this state.
- 21 (b) Make recommendations to the legislature on amendments to
- 22 this act that would improve the regulatory structure of horse
- 23 racing in this state with a goal of maintaining the long-term
- 24 viability of horse racing in this state.
- (c) Annually submit a report to the legislature detailing its
- 26 recommendations under subdivisions (a) and (b).
- 27 (d) Expend money received under section 20a, as appropriated
- 28 by the legislature, for the following purposes:
- 29 (i) Promotion and marketing of horse racing.

1 (ii) Equine-related research.

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- 2 (iii) Grants for equine-related support and aftercare and3 programs related to horse racing.
- 4 (13) The racing commissioner shall take under consideration
 5 the procedures established by the advisory commission under
 6 subsection (12)(a) in performing his or her the commissioner's
 7 duties under this act.
- 8 Sec. 20. (1) It is the policy of this state to encourage the 9 breeding of horses of all breeds in this state and the ownership of 10 such horses by residents of this state to provide for sufficient 11 numbers of high quality race horses of all breeds to participate in 12 licensed race meetings in this state; to promote the positive 13 growth and development of high quality horse racing and other 14 equine competitions in this state as a business and entertainment activity for residents of this state; and to establish and preserve 15 the substantial agricultural and commercial benefits of the horse 16 17 racing and breeding industry to this state. It is the intent of the 18 legislature to further this policy by the provisions of this act 19 and annual appropriations to administer this act and adequately 20 fund the agriculture and equine industry programs established by this section. 21
 - (2) Except for money generated from the tax on wagers processed through licensed third-party facilitators operating under this act under section 22, money received by the racing commissioner and the state treasurer under this act must be paid promptly into the state treasury and placed in the Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund created in subsection (3).
- 29 (3) The Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund

- 1 is created in the department of treasury. The Michigan agriculture
- 2 equine industry development fund must be administered by the
- 3 director of the department of agriculture and rural development
- 4 with the assistance and advice of the racing commissioner.
- 5 (4) Money must not be expended from the Michigan agriculture
- 6 equine industry development fund except as appropriated by the
- 7 legislature. Money appropriated by the legislature from the
- 8 Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund must be
- 9 expended by the director of the department of agriculture and rural
- 10 development with the advice and assistance of the racing
- 11 commissioner to provide funding for agriculture and equine industry
- 12 development programs in the following priority:
- (a) To make expenditures as provided in subsections (5) to
- 14 $\frac{(11)}{(11)}$.through (7) and (9).
- 15 (b) No more than \$125,000.00 annually to the horse racing
- 16 advisory commission established under section 6a.
- 17 (c) An amount to the Michigan gaming control board deemed as
- 18 reasonable and necessary to accomplish the regulation and
- 19 administrative costs under this act.
- 20 (5) The following amounts must be paid to standardbred and
- 21 fair programs:
- 22 (a) A sum not to exceed $\frac{75}{90}$ % of the purses for standardbred
- 23 harness horse races offered by fairs and races at licensed pari-
- 24 mutuel racetracks. Purse supplements paid under this subdivision
- 25 for overnight races at fairs for which Michigan sired, Michigan
- 26 bred, or Michigan owned harness horses are eligible must be
- 27 \$1,000.00. However, if the average purse offered for maiden
- 28 overnight races of the same breed at any licensed race meeting in
- 29 this state during the previous year as calculated by the department

- of agriculture and rural development was less than \$1,000.00, purse
 supplements for overnight races at fairs paid under this
 subdivision must not exceed that average purse.
- 4 (b) A sum to be allotted on a matching basis, but not to
 5 exceed \$15,000.00 each year to a single fair, for the purpose of
 6 equipment rental during fairs; ground improvement; constructing,
 7 maintaining, and repairing buildings; and making the racetrack more
 8 suitable and safe for racing at fairs.
 - (c) A sum to be allotted From the amount appropriated from the fund for purses and supplements fairs/licensed tracks:

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- (i) Thirty percent for overnight races at fairs for which Michigan sired, Michigan bred, or Michigan owned harness horses are eligible.
- 13 14 (ii) Seventy percent for paying special purses at fairs on 2-15 year-old and 3-year-old standardbred harness horses conceived after 16 January 1, 1992, that is Michigan bred, or that is sired by a 17 standardbred stallion registered with the department of agriculture 18 and rural development, that was leased or owned by a resident or residents of this state, and that did not serve a mare at a 19 20 location outside of this state from February 1 through July 31 of the calendar year in which the conception occurred. A foal that is 21 22 born on or after January 1, 2002 of a mare owned by a nonresident of this state and that is conceived outside of this state from 23 24 transported semen of a stallion registered with the department of 25 agriculture and rural development is eliqible for Michigan tax-26 supported races only if, in the year that the foal is conceived, the department of agriculture and rural development's agent for 27 28 receiving funds as the holding agent for stakes and futurities is 29 paid a transport fee as determined by the department of agriculture

- and rural development and administered by the Michigan HarnessHorsemen's Association.
- 3 (d) A sum to pay not more than 75%—90% of an eligible cash
 4 premium paid by a fair or exposition. The commission of agriculture
 5 and rural development shall promulgate rules establishing which
 6 premiums are eligible for payment and a dollar limit for all
 7 eligible payments.
- 8 (e) A sum to pay breeders' awards in an amount not to exceed 9 10%-20% of the gross purse to breeders of Michigan bred 10 standardbred harness horses for each time the horse wins a race at 11 a licensed race meeting or fair in this state. As used in this 12 subdivision, "Michigan bred standardbred harness horse" means a 13 horse from a mare owned by a resident or residents of this state at 14 the time of conception, that was conceived after January 1, 1992, 15 and sired by a standardbred stallion registered with the department 16 of agriculture and rural development that was leased or owned by a 17 resident or residents of this state and that did not serve a mare 18 at a location outside of this state from February 1 through July 31 19 of the calendar year in which the conception occurred. To be 20 eligible, each mare must be registered with the department of agriculture and rural development. A foal that is born on or after 21 January 1, 2002 of a mare owned by a nonresident of this state and 22 23 that is conceived outside of this state from transported semen of a 24 stallion registered with the department of agriculture and rural 25 development is eligible for Michigan tax-supported races only if, in the year that the foal is conceived, the department of 26 27 agriculture and rural development's agent for receiving funds as 28 the holding agent for stakes and futurities is paid a transport fee 29 as determined by the department of agriculture and rural

- 1 development and administered by the Michigan Harness Horsemen's
 2 Association.
- 3 (f) A sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 \$12,000.00 each year to be
 4 allotted to fairs to provide training and stabling facilities for standardbred harness horses.
- 6 (q) A sum to be allotted to pay the presiding judges and 7 clerks of the course at fairs. Presiding judges and clerks of the 8 course must be hired by the fair's administrative body with the advice and approval of the racing commissioner. The director of the 9 10 department of agriculture and rural development may allot funds for 11 a photo finish system and a mobile starting gate. The director of 12 the department of agriculture and rural development shall allot funds for the conducting of tests, the collection and laboratory 13 14 analysis of urine, saliva, blood, and other samples from horses, 15 and the taking of blood alcohol tests on drivers, jockeys, and starting gate employees, for those races described in this 16 17 subdivision. The department may require a driver, jockey, or 18 starting gate employee to submit to a breathalyzer test, urine 19 test, or other noninvasive fluid test to detect the presence of alcohol or a controlled substance. If the results of a test show 20 that a person has more than .05% of alcohol in his or her the 21 22 person's blood, or has present in his or her the person's body a 23 controlled substance, the person is not permitted to continue in 24 his or her the person's duties on that race day and until he or she 25 the person can produce, at his or her the person's own expense, a 26 negative test result.
- (h) A sum to pay purse supplements to licensed pari-mutuelharness race meetings for special 4-year-old filly and colt horseraces.

- (i) A sum not to exceed 0.25% of all money wagered on 1 2 live and simulcast horse races in this state must be placed in a special standardbred sire stakes fund each year, 100% of which must 3 be used to provide purses for races run exclusively for 2-year-old 4 5 and 3-year-old Michigan sired standardbred horses at licensed 6 harness race meetings in this state. As used in this subdivision, 7 "Michigan sired standardbred horses" means standardbred horses 8 conceived after January 1, 1992 and sired by a standardbred 9 stallion registered with the department of agriculture and rural 10 development that was leased or owned by a resident or residents of 11 this state and that did not serve a mare at a location outside of 12 this state from February 1 through July 31 of the calendar year in which the conception occurred. A foal that is born on or after 13 14 January 1, 2002 of a mare owned by a nonresident of this state and 15 that is conceived outside of this state from transported semen of a 16 stallion registered with the department of agriculture and rural development is eliqible for Michigan tax-supported races only if, 17 18 in the year that the foal is conceived, the department of 19 agriculture and rural development's agent for receiving funds as 20 the holding agent for stakes and futurities is paid a transport fee as determined by the department of agriculture and rural 21 development and administered by the Michigan Harness Horsemen's 22 23 Association.
- 24 (6) The following amounts must be paid to thoroughbred
 25 programs:
- (a) A sum to be allotted thoroughbred race meeting licensees
 to supplement the purses for races to be conducted exclusively for
 Michigan bred horses.
- 29 (b) A sum to pay awards to owners of Michigan bred horses that

- finish first, second, or third in races open to non-Michigan bredhorses.
- 3 (c) A sum to pay breeders' awards in an amount not to exceed
- 4 10% 20% of the gross purse to the breeders of Michigan bred
- 5 thoroughbred horses for each time Michigan bred thoroughbred horses
- 6 win at a licensed race meeting in this state.
- 7 (d) A sum to pay purse supplements to licensed thoroughbred
- 8 race meetings for special 4-year-old and older filly and colt horse
- 9 races.
- 10 (e) A sum not to exceed 0.25% 0.5% of all money wagered on
- 11 live and simulcast horse races in this state must be placed in a
- 12 special thoroughbred sire stakes fund each year, 100% of which must
- 13 be used to provide purses for races run exclusively for 2-year-old
- 14 and 3-year-old and older Michigan sired thoroughbred horses at
- 15 licensed thoroughbred race meetings in this state and awards for
- 16 owners of Michigan sired horses or stallions. As used in this
- 17 subdivision, "Michigan sired thoroughbred horses" means
- 18 thoroughbred horses sired by a stallion registered with the
- 19 department of agriculture and rural development that was leased or
- 20 owned exclusively by a resident or residents of this state and that
- 21 did not serve a mare at a location outside of this state during the
- 22 calendar year in which the service occurred.
- 23 (7) The following amounts must be paid for quarter horse
- 24 programs:
- 25 (a) A sum to supplement the purses for races to be conducted
- 26 exclusively for Michigan bred quarter horses.
- (b) A sum to pay not more than 75% of the purses for
- 28 registered quarter horse races offered by fairs.
- (c) A sum to pay breeders' awards in an amount not to exceed

10% of a gross purse to breeders of Michigan bred guarter horses 1 2 for each time a Michigan bred quarter horse wins at a county fair 3 or licensed race meeting in this state. (d) As used in this subsection, "Michigan bred quarter horse" 4 means Michigan bred guarter horse as that term is defined in R 5 285.817.1 of the Michigan Administrative Code. Each mare and 6 7 stallion must be registered with the director of the department of 8 agriculture and rural development. 9 (8) The following amounts must be paid for Appaloosa programs: 10 (a) A sum to supplement the purses for races to be conducted exclusively for Michigan bred Appaloosa horses. 11 12 (b) A sum to pay not more than 75% of the purses for 13 registered Appaloosa horse races offered by fairs. 14 (c) A sum to pay breeders' awards in an amount not to exceed 15 10% of the gross purse to the breeders of Michigan bred Appaloosa 16 horses for each time Michigan bred horses win at a fair or licensed 17 race meeting in this state. (d) As used in this subsection, "Michigan bred Appaloosa 18 19 horse" means a Michigan bred Appaloosa horse as that term is 20 defined in R 285.819.1 of the Michigan Administrative Code. Each 21 mare and stallion must be registered with the director of the 22 department of agriculture and rural development. 23 (9) The following amounts must be paid for Arabian programs: 24 (a) A sum to supplement the purses for races to be conducted 25 exclusively for Michigan bred Arabian horses. 26 (b) A sum to pay not more than 75% of the purses for 27 registered Arabian horse races offered by fairs. (c) A sum to pay breeders' awards in an amount not to exceed 28

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10% of the gross purse to the breeders of Michigan bred Arabian

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- 1 horses for each time Michigan bred horses win at a fair or licensed
 2 racetrack in this state.
- 3 (d) As used in this subsection, "Michigan bred Arabian horse"
- 4 means a Michigan bred horse as that term is defined in R
- 5 285.822.1(i) of the Michigan Administrative Code. Each mare and
- 6 stallion shall be registered with the director of the department of
- 7 agriculture and rural development.

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- 8 (10) The following sums must be paid for American paint horse
 9 programs:
- 10 (a) A sum to supplement the purses for races to be conducted

 11 exclusively for Michigan bred American paint horses.
- (b) A sum to pay not more than 75% of the purses for registered American paint horse races offered by fairs.
- (c) A sum to pay breeders' awards in an amount not to exceed

 15 10% of the gross purse to the breeders of Michigan bred American

 16 paint horses for each time a Michigan bred American paint horse

 17 wins at a county fair or licensed race meeting in this state.
- (d) As used in this subsection, "Michigan bred American paint
 horse" means a Michigan bred paint horse as that term is defined in
 R 285.823.1 of the Michigan Administrative Code.
 - (7) (11) The following amounts must—If the Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund has a balance at the end of the fiscal year, remaining money may be paid out in amounts up to \$250,000.00 for the equine industry research, planning, and development, grant fund program:including, but not limited to, either of the following:
- (a) A sum to fund grants for research projects conducted by
 persons affiliated with a university or governmental research
 agency or institution or other private research entity approved by

- the racing commissioner, which are beneficial to the horse racingand breeding industry in this state.
- 3 (b) A sum to fund the development, implementation, and
 4 administration of new programs that promote the proper growth and
 5 development of the horse racing and breeding industry in this state
 6 and other valuable equine-related commercial and recreational
 7 activities in this state.
- 8 (8) $\frac{(12)}{}$ As used in subsection $\frac{(11)}{}$ (7), "equine industry 9 research" means the study, discovery and generation of accurate and 10 reliable information, findings, conclusions, and recommendations 11 that are useful or beneficial to the horse racing and breeding industry in this state through improvement of the health of horses; 12 prevention of equine illness and disease, and performance-related 13 14 accidents and injuries; improvement of breeding technique and 15 racing performance; and compilation and study of valuable and 16 reliable statistical data regarding the size, organization, and economics of the industry in this state; and strategic planning for 17 18 the effective promotion, growth, and development of the industry in 19 this state.
 - (9) $\frac{(13)}{(13)}$ An amount must be allotted annually to the racing commissioner that is sufficient to pay for the collection and laboratory analysis of urine, saliva, blood, and other samples from horses and licensed individuals involved in horse racing on which pari-mutuel wagers are made and for the conducting of tests described in section 16(4).

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(10) (14) Money appropriated and allotted to the Michigan agriculture equine industry development fund must not revert to the general fund and must be carried forward from year to year until disbursed to fund grants for research projects beneficial to the

- 1 industry.
- 2 (11) (15)—A percentage of the Michigan agriculture equine
- 3 industry development fund that is equal to $\frac{1}{15}$ 1/10 of 1% of the
- 4 gross wagers made each year in each of the racetracks licensed
- 5 under this act must be deposited in the compulsive gaming
- 6 prevention fund created in section 3 of the compulsive gaming
- 7 prevention act, 1997 PA 70, MCL 432.253.
- 8 (12) (16) The director of the department of agriculture and
- 9 rural development shall promulgate rules pursuant to the
- 10 administrative procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.201 to
- 11 24.328, to implement this section. The rules promulgated under this
- 12 subsection must do all of the following:
- 13 (a) Prescribe the conditions under which the Michigan
- 14 agriculture equine industry development fund and related programs
- 15 described in subsections (1) to $\frac{(14)}{(10)}$ must be funded.
- 16 (b) Establish conditions and penalties regarding the programs
- 17 described in subsections (5) to $\frac{(12)\cdot(8)}{\cdot}$.
- 18 (c) Develop and maintain informational programs related to
- 19 this section.
- 20 (13) (17) Funds under the control of the department of
- 21 agriculture and rural development in this section must be disbursed
- 22 under the rules promulgated under subsection (16). (12). All funds
- 23 under the control of the department of agriculture and rural
- 24 development approved for purse supplements and breeders' awards
- 25 must be paid by the state treasurer not later than 45 days from the
- 26 date of the race.
- 27 (14) (18) Purses paid under this section must be based on
- 28 actual purses awarded in a race. If the actual purses awarded are
- 29 less than the purse supplement amount requested by a fair or

licensed pari-mutuel racetrack at the time they applied to the 1 2 department of agriculture and rural development for the purse 3 supplement, the purse supplement paid must be the lesser amount. 4 (19) If the amount allocated to the Michigan agriculture 5 equine industry development fund under this act or any other source exceeds \$8,000,000.00 in a fiscal year, the amount in excess of 6 7 \$8,000,000.00 must be allocated to the pari-mutuel horse racing 8 disbursement account under section 19.
