## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 22

Senator Shirkey offered the following concurrent resolution:

- 1 A concurrent resolution offered as a memorial for Shirley
- 2 Johnson, former member of the House of Representatives and the
- 3 Senate.
- 4 Whereas, The members of the Michigan Legislature were deeply
- 5 saddened to learn of the passing of Shirley Johnson. A long-serving
- 6 member of this legislative body, she will be remembered as a hard-
- 7 working legislator who did not shy away from tough jobs or issues.
- 8 She was a tireless public servant who worked for the betterment of
- 9 her constituents in Oakland County and Michiganders across the
- 10 state; and

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- 11 Whereas, Shirley Johnson was a native of Chicago and moved to
- 12 Michigan when her husband accepted a job with Chrysler. She
- 13 attended Wayne State University and Oakland Community College.
- 14 Shirley Johnson became very engaged in her new community, both as a

- 1 leader and member of various organizations dealing with health,
- 2 education, politics, and other matters. Her community engagement
- 3 included being president of the Royal Oak Republican Women's Club,
- 4 a coordinator for the March of Dimes and Muscular Dystrophy
- 5 Association, and a member of the League of Women Voters and the
- 6 Royal Oak and Berkley parent teacher associations, among other
- 7 endeavors. In addition to her community service, she worked in
- 8 private industry. Shirley Johnson's entry into legislative service
- 9 started when she managed the winning campaign for State
- 10 Representative Dave Campbell and subsequently worked in his office.
- 11 Her vast experiences and civic-minded spirit prepared her well for
- 12 her time as a legislator; and
- 13 Whereas, First elected to the House of Representatives in
- 14 1980, Shirley Johnson's tenure in the House lasted for 18 years
- 15 through 1998. Shirley Johnson broke the glass ceiling when she
- 16 became the first woman to serve as majority vice chair of the House
- 17 Appropriations Committee. She served on many appropriations
- 18 subcommittees, including those dealing with social services,
- 19 health, consumer and industry issues, the judiciary, and many other
- 20 areas. In the House, she was also vice chair of the standing
- 21 Committee on Colleges and Universities and a member of the standing
- 22 committees on Constitutional Revision and Women's Rights, Public
- 23 Safety, Senior Citizens and Retirement, and Urban Affairs; and
- 24 Whereas, In March of 1999, Shirley Johnson won a special
- 25 election to the Senate and was re-elected in 2002. Dealing with the
- 26 budget and crafting smart, sound appropriations bills were still at
- 27 the forefront of Shirley Johnson's legislative career. In fact, she
- 28 broke ground again as the first woman to chair an appropriations
- 29 committee, doing so in the Senate. In addition to serving as chair

- 1 of the Senate Appropriations Committee, she chaired the
- 2 subcommittees on Career Development and Strategic Fund Agency,
- 3 Capital Outlay, and Transportation; was vice chair of the
- 4 subcommittees on General Government, Higher Education, and the
- 5 Department of Natural Resources; and was a member of the
- 6 subcommittee on Community Health. In the Senate, she also served on
- 7 the standing Committee on Education as vice chair; as a member of
- 8 the standing Committee on Families, Mental Health and Human
- 9 Services; and on the Legislative Council and the Senate Fiscal
- 10 Agency Governing Board; and
- 11 Whereas, Shirley Johnson was known to be an effective
- 12 legislator who mastered the appropriations process during difficult
- 13 economic times. Her diligent work and strong leadership on the
- 14 appropriations committees guided the wise allocation and use of
- 15 taxpayer dollars; and
- 16 Whereas, While the state budget was her specialty, Shirley
- 17 Johnson also worked on many other issues in her more than 25 years
- 18 in the Legislature. She was an early advocate for improving mental
- 19 health policy. Welfare and school finance reform were two of the
- 20 multitude of other issues in which she shepherded the passage of
- 21 legislation. She also sponsored a bill to allow mothers to safely
- 22 and legally abandon a newborn, among many other policies; and
- 23 Whereas, Shirley Johnson was a tremendous lawmaker, evidenced
- 24 by the numerous awards she received during her time in office from
- 25 both local and statewide organizations, including being named
- 26 Legislator of the Year by the Michigan Association of Community
- 27 Mental Health Boards, United Cerebral Palsy of Michigan, the
- 28 Michigan Credit Union League, and the Michigan Judges Association,
- 29 among others. She was honored for her great work by advocates of

- 1 business interests, health matters, children's rights, and other
- 2 issues; and
- 3 Whereas, Shirley Johnson's reputation is one of a fierce
- 4 advocate who worked across the aisle to get things done. It has
- 5 been said that no woman wielded more power in the history of the
- 6 Michigan Legislature than Shirley Johnson. In fact, only one other
- 7 woman has served longer in the Michigan Legislature than Shirley
- 8 Johnson's tenure of 25 years and 9 months; and
- 9 Whereas, Shirley Johnson was more than a public servant. She
- 10 loved her family and was proud to be called wife, mom, and grandma.
- 11 Moreover, Shirley Johnson's staff was also her family. Under her
- 12 mentorship and high expectations, many are now leaders in
- 13 organizations and businesses that regularly interface with the
- 14 Legislature. Her love also extended to the Capitol building where
- 15 she was known to give impromptu tours and invite strangers in to
- 16 see her office; and
- 17 Whereas, Shirley Johnson was a committed and hardworking
- 18 legislator who cherished her family. Upon her passing, we offer our
- 19 condolences to her family and friends. We hope that they may find
- 20 comfort in the knowledge that the community and state share in
- 21 their bereavement and that the legacy of Shirley Johnson's
- 22 contributions will long continue to enrich our state; now,
- 23 therefore, be it
- 24 Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives
- 25 concurring), That we offer this expression of our highest tribute
- 26 to honor the memory of Shirley Johnson, a member of the House of
- 27 Representatives from 1981 to 1998 and a member of the Senate from
- 28 1999 to 2006; and be it further
- 29 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the

1 Johnson family as evidence of our lasting esteem for her memory.
