SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO.5

Senator Polehanki offered the following concurrent resolution: 1 A concurrent resolution to urge the United States Department of Education to grant waivers for Michigan state assessment 2 3 requirements under the Every Student Succeeds Act. 4 Whereas, State and federal laws require schools to assess student learning every year in specific grade levels and subjects. 5 Under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), states must 6 administer annual statewide assessments. If states do not meet 7 8 certain requirements, the U.S. Department of Education may withhold 9 federal funding; and 10 Whereas, Michigan meets this federal requirement in part by requiring schools to administer standardized tests. The Michigan 11 12 Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP) is given to students 13 online in grades 3-7 to measure their knowledge of state standards 14 in English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Michigan

- 1 Department of Education also administers the PSAT 8/9 which
- 2 replaced the M-STEP ELA and mathematics assessment for grade 8. The
- 3 M-STEP and the PSAT 8/9 aim to provide valuable information to
- 4 parents and teachers on student academic performance that help
- 5 schools and districts evaluate curriculum and programming
- 6 effectiveness; and
- 7 Whereas, While the PSAT 8/9 is paper-based and the M-STEP is
- 8 administered online, students normally take both assessments under
- 9 the supervision of an administrator who can ensure test security.
- 10 Maintaining uniform procedures for test administration helps ensure
- 11 that results are accurate and meaningful and that no student has an
- 12 unfair advantage in their assessment performance; and
- 13 Whereas, In light of the uncertainty of in-person school
- 14 attendance for the rest of the 2020-21 school year due to the
- 15 COVID-19 Pandemic, it will be difficult to prepare uniform
- 16 procedures for administration of state assessments. This may result
- 17 in decreased test security and overall confusion regarding the
- 18 process, which may detract from the reliability of the assessment
- 19 results; and
- 20 Whereas, The U.S. Department of Education announced that they
- 21 will grant a waiver to any state that is unable to assess its
- 22 students due to the ongoing national emergency brought on by the
- 23 COVID-19 Pandemic for the current 2019-2020 school year. The
- 24 decision was made in order to allow students to focus on learning
- 25 and staying healthy while allowing teachers time to adapt to remote
- 26 learning; and
- 27 Whereas, School districts will continue to face enormous
- 28 burdens and challenges as they scramble to prepare for education
- 29 under new and uncertain circumstances in the upcoming school year.

- 1 It is essential that we allow them flexibility to ease some of
- 2 those burdens. While state assessments provide valuable
- 3 information, we should allow schools to focus their limited
- 4 resources and energy on other initiatives; now, therefore, be it
- 5 Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives
- 6 concurring), That we urge the United States Department of Education
- 7 to grant waivers for Michigan state assessment requirements under
- 8 the Every Student Succeeds Act for the 2020-2021 school year; and
- 9 be it further
- 10 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 11 United States Secretary of Education.
