SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 29

Senator VanderWall offered the following concurrent resolution: A concurrent resolution to urge the Governor of Michigan, the

2 Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of

3 Insurance and Financial Services, the Department of Licensing and

4 Regulatory Affairs, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation,

and other executive departments to take action to make insulin more

6 accessible and affordable.

7 Whereas, Diabetes affects nearly 37.3 million people in the

8 United States, and, as of 2020, an estimated 12.3 percent of

9 Michigan residents - over one million people - reported being

10 diagnosed with diabetes. People who live with diabetes are subject

11 to increased medical costs, negative health risks such as shortened

12 lifespans, and a host of other consequences. The Centers for

13 Disease Control and Prevention estimates that 5 to 10 percent of

14 people with diabetes have type 1 diabetes, which requires daily

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- 1 insulin to survive; and
- 2 Whereas, The provision of insulin is crucial for the 5 to 10
- 3 percent of people with type 1 diabetes, and people with type 2
- 4 diabetes may also rely on insulin to manage their condition. Many
- 5 cannot afford the rapidly increasing costs of insulin, causing them
- 6 to skip or ration their medication, which leads to further health
- 7 consequences. Michigan citizens are often forced to choose between
- 8 medication and other costs; and
- 9 Whereas, Diabetes is an expensive condition, and the high and
- 10 increasing cost of insulin is putting financial, emotional, and
- 11 physical stress on many Michigan residents. In 2018, the average
- 12 price of a single vial of insulin was \$98.70, which results in
- 13 costs of up to \$300 per month for those who need just two or three
- 14 vials. For those who need more than three vials or take multiple
- 15 forms of insulin, that monthly cost can easily double. Also,
- 16 injectable devices with mixed insulin can cost upwards of \$700 for
- 17 just five pens. The creation of generic and biosimilar insulin has
- 18 helped reduce the price, but some are not able to use these options
- 19 and must still use traditional, more expensive insulin. From 2014
- 20 to 2019, the average retail price for insulin increased by a
- 21 drastic 54 percent. The COVID-19 pandemic, which resulted in many
- 22 losing their jobs, only exacerbated the financial burden of living
- 23 with diabetes; and
- 24 Whereas, If we do not address the rising costs of insulin, we
- 25 put vulnerable Michiganders at risk and endanger their long term
- 26 health by increasing the possibilities of complications stemming
- 27 from diabetes, as well as increase costs to the health care system.
- 28 As leaders of Michigan, we must aggressively initiate action to
- 29 make insulin more accessible and affordable for all who need it;

- 2 Whereas, All insulin users, including those with both public
- 3 or private insurance plans, deserve affordable and accessible life-
- 4 saving drugs. To provide that access, the State of Michigan should
- 5 launch further investigation and review of how we can use public
- 6 and private partnerships to acquire insulin in bulk at lower prices
- 7 or produce insulin. This investigation should include the
- 8 development of a strategic plan on how the State can manufacture
- 9 and distribute insulin; now, therefore, be it
- 10 Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives
- 11 concurring), That we urge the Governor of Michigan, the Michigan
- 12 Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of
- 13 Insurance and Financial Services, the Department of Licensing and
- 14 Regulatory Affairs, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation,
- 15 and other executive departments to take action to make insulin more
- 16 accessible and affordable; and be it further
- 17 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 18 Governor of Michigan, the Director of the Michigan Department of
- 19 Health and Human Services, the Director of the Michigan Department
- 20 of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs, the Director of the Michigan
- 21 Department of Insurance and Financial Services, and the Chief
- 22 Executive and Economic Competitiveness Officer of the Michigan
- 23 Economic Development Corporation.
