HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.200

Reps. Puri, Aiyash, Bezotte, Breen, Haadsma, Kahle, Morse, Rogers, Sneller, Sowerby, Steenland, Thanedar and Witwer offered the following resolution:

1 A resolution to declare December 1-7, 2021, as Crohn's Disease 2 and Ulcerative Colitis Awareness Week in the state of Michigan.

3 Whereas, Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis are

4 inflammatory bowel diseases that cause chronic inflammation and

5 damage in the gastrointestinal tract and impair the ability of the

6 affected organs to function properly. The most common symptoms of

7 these two diseases are persistent diarrhea, abdominal pain, rectal

8 bleeding, weight loss, and fatigue; and

9 Whereas, Individuals with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD)

10 often go through periods of remission with few or no symptoms,

- 1 alternating with periods of flare-ups when the disease is active
- 2 and presenting symptoms; and
- 3 Whereas, The exact cause of these diseases is not entirely
- 4 understood, but they do involve a complex interaction between
- 5 genes, the immune system and environmental factors; and
- 6 Whereas, Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis affect
- 7 millions of adults and children in the United States. These
- 8 diseases are most often diagnosed in adolescence and early
- 9 adulthood between 15 and 35 years of age. The conditions are
- 10 chronic and can significantly affect a patient's quality of life;

- 12 Whereas, Cases of inflammatory bowel diseases are on the rise
- 13 in the United States. The annual financial burden of inflammatory
- 14 bowel diseases in the United States is estimated to be between
- 15 \$14.6 and \$31.6 billion. The costs of care for IBD have increased
- 16 in the last 5 years and are driven by specific therapeutics and
- 17 disease features; and
- 18 Whereas, Compared with non-IBD controls, IBD patients are
- 19 increasingly incurring higher costs associated with health care
- 20 utilization, out-of-pocket expenditures, and workplace productivity
- 21 losses; and
- Whereas, There is no cure for Crohn's disease or ulcerative
- 23 colitis, only medications and treatments that aim to suppress
- 24 inflammation, achieve and maintain remission and improve overall
- 25 quality of life; and
- 26 Whereas, Even with treatment, 23 to 45% of people with
- 27 ulcerative colitis require surgery after 30 years with the disease,
- 28 and approximately 75% of people with Crohn's disease eventually
- 29 require surgery; and

Whereas, The Crohn's and Colitis Foundation sponsors cutting-1 2 edge research to find a cure and works diligently to improve the quality of life of children and adults affected by these diseases 3 through a wide range of educational programs and support services 4 5 for both patients and health care professionals; and Whereas, "Crohn's Disease and Ulcerative Colitis Awareness 6 7 Week" increases public awareness of these diseases, acknowledges 8 the medical and financial impact these diseases have on affected 9 individuals and their families and promotes initiatives to improve 10 treatments and find a cure for Crohn's disease and ulcerative 11 colitis; now, therefore, be it 12 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body declare December 1-7, 2021, as Crohn's 13 14 Disease and Ulcerative Colitis Awareness Week in the state of 15 Michigan. We acknowledge individuals suffering from these diseases
