HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.311

Rep. Bruck offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution to declare December 2024 as War Dogs Month in the 2 state of Michigan.
- 3 Whereas, Throughout the history of the United States military,
- 4 from World War II to the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan,
- 5 military working dogs have played a crucial role in safeguarding
- 6 the lives of soldiers and civilians alike, acting as sentinels,
- 7 scouts, and companions on the battlefield; and
- 8 Whereas, The contributions of these courageous canines are
- 9 evidenced by the numbers: during World War II, war dogs saved an
- 10 estimated 15,000 lives, and in Vietnam, they were credited with
- 11 saving at least 10,000 American soldiers. On approximately 87,000
- 12 missions, these dogs uncovered 2,000 tunnels and bunkers and

- 1 facilitated 1,000 enemy captures and 4,000 enemy kills; and
- 2 Whereas, The impact of military working dogs has continued
- 3 through subsequent conflicts. In Afghanistan, Technical Sergeant
- 4 Justin Kitts and his dog Dyngo exemplified this heroism, securing
- 5 the lives of 30,000 U.S., host nation, and coalition forces in
- 6 2011. This example underscores the life-saving capabilities of
- 7 these dogs, whose efforts often go unrecognized, but whose presence
- 8 on the battlefield and in rehabilitation centers has been
- 9 invaluable; and
- 10 Whereas, The history of military working dogs reflects a
- 11 troubling pattern of initial recognition, followed by a decline in
- 12 support once conflicts end. Post-World War II and post-Vietnam, the
- 13 U.S. military disassembled its war dog programs, despite their
- 14 proven effectiveness. Tracker and scout dog units were dismantled,
- 15 and the programs that once saved countless lives were forgotten,
- 16 only to be revived with the onset of new conflicts decades later;

- 18 Whereas, Following the attacks of September 11, 2001, and the
- 19 commencement of wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, the urgent need for
- 20 military working dogs reemerged. Despite their critical roles in
- 21 detecting improvised explosive devices (IEDs) and patrolling
- 22 dangerous terrain, the programs that supported the rapid deployment
- 23 of these dogs were scaled back as the conflicts wound down.
- 24 Budgetary constraints and shifting military priorities threaten the
- 25 continuity and readiness of these canine units once again; and
- 26 Whereas, The Robby Law, enacted to prevent the neglect of
- 27 retiring military dogs, represents a crucial step in acknowledging
- 28 the sacrifices of these animals. However, the continued downsizing
- 29 of dog programs signals a potential loss of valuable lessons

learned from previous wars, jeopardizing future military 1 preparedness and the safety of soldiers; and 2 Whereas, The dedicated handlers who served alongside these 3 dogs have become the guardians of their legacy, preserving the 4 5 memory of their contributions, building memorials, and advocating 6 for recognition. Their institutional knowledge, combined with the 7 stories of young soldiers expressing gratitude for the lives saved by these dogs, serves as a powerful reminder of the unique bond 8 9 between handlers and their canine partners; now, therefore, be it 10 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of 11 this legislative body declare December 2024 as War Dogs Month in the state of Michigan. We recognize the extraordinary service of 12 military working dogs and their handlers, honoring their vital 13 14 contributions to the safety and success of U.S. military operations 15 across generations; and be it further Resolved, That this legislative body calls for sustained 16 support and investment in military working dog programs, ensuring 17 18 that these invaluable assets are preserved, properly trained, and integrated into future military strategies to prevent the 19 20 repetition of past mistakes and to honor the legacy of those who have already served; and be it further 21 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to military 22

leadership, veterans' organizations, and advocacy groups to raise
awareness of the importance of maintaining robust and ready
military working dog programs, and to express our profound
gratitude to the handlers and their canine partners who have served
our nation with honor and distinction.
