SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 6

Senator Singh offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution condemning the attack on the United States
- 2 Capitol on January 6, 2021, including the assault on the courageous
- 3 members of the Capitol Police, and denouncing the use of
- 4 presidential pardon power to absolve those who participated in the
- 5 dangerous and anti-democratic riots.
- 6 Whereas, On January 6, 2021, a violent mob overwhelmed Capitol
- 7 Police and breached the United States Capitol Building, disrupting
- 8 the peaceful transfer of power; and
- 9 Whereas, This attack on the United States Capitol resulted in
- 10 traumatic injuries to approximately 140 law enforcement officers;
- **11** and
- 12 Whereas, This violent insurrection was not only an attack on
- 13 the United States Capitol Building, but on the rule of law, the
- 14 values of American democracy, and the Constitution, which are the

- 1 bedrocks of the American Republic; and
- 2 Whereas, The United States Capitol Police, alongside other law
- 3 enforcement agencies, displayed extraordinary courage,
- 4 professionalism, and commitment to their duties in the face of
- 5 overwhelming danger while defending our nation's capital,
- 6 protecting members of Congress, and ensuring the safety of those
- 7 within the Capitol Building; and
- 8 Whereas, The Capitol Police, many of whom faced physical harm,
- 9 acted with valor to prevent further escalation of violence, and
- 10 suffered life-altering injuries in the course of their duties; and
- Whereas, On January 20th, 2025, President Trump's pardoning
- 12 of, or commutation of sentences for, 1,500 criminals involved in
- 13 the violent insurrection is an act of betrayal to the brave law
- 14 enforcement officers who put their lives on the line on January 6,
- 15 2021, as well as to the citizens of the United States; and
- Whereas, Among the 1,500 criminals pardoned by President
- 17 Trump, 169 of them were found quilty of assaulting police officers,
- 18 including one who assaulted Metropolitan Police Department Officer
- 19 Noah Rathbun with a flagpole, another who jammed a stun gun into
- 20 the neck of Washington Police Officer Michael Fanone multiple
- 21 times, and another who sprayed multiple officers with bear spray;
- 22 and
- 23 Whereas, The International Association of Chiefs of Police and
- 24 the Fraternal Order of Police jointly condemned these presidential
- 25 pardons and commutations, stating that "crimes against law
- 26 enforcement are not just attacks on individuals or public safety -
- 27 they are attacked on society and undermine the rule of law" and
- 28 that when perpetrators of violent crime against law enforcement are
- 29 not held accountable, it emboldens others to commit similar acts of

- 1 violence; now, therefore, be it
- 2 Resolved by the Senate, That we condemn the attack on the
- 3 United States Capitol on January 6, 2021, including the assault on
- 4 the courageous members of the Capitol Police, and denounce the use
- 5 of presidential pardon power to absolve those who participated in
- 6 the dangerous and anti-democratic riots; and be it further
- Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 8 President of the United States, the President Pro Tempore of the
- 9 United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of
- 10 Representatives, and the members of the Michigan congressional
- 11 delegation.
